PIEDMONT HENRY HOSPITAL'S MOST RECENT CHNA WAS CONDUCTED IN PARTNERSHIP WITH THE HENRY COUNTY GOVERNMENT, HENRY COUNTY HEALTH DEPARTMENT, HENRY COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE, HENRY COUNTY BOARD OF EDUCATION AND HENRY COUNTY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE. HOSPITAL AND PIEDMONT HEALTHCARE STAFF REVIEWED PUBLICLY AVAILABLE HEALTH AND SOCIOECONOMIC DATA, AS WELL AS DATA COLLECTED THROUGH FOCUS GROUPS, COMMUNITY MEETINGS, AND A COMMUNITY HEALTH SURVEY. THE COMMUNITY HEALTH SURVEY WAS MADE AVAILABLE IN 61 COUNTY-BASED LOCATIONS AS WELL AS ON THE HOSPITAL'S WEBSITE. ALL RESPONSES TO THE SURVEY WERE AGGREGATED, ANALYZED, AND INTERPRETED BY A FACULTY MEMBER OF THE GEORGIA SOUTHERN UNIVERSITY'S JIANN-PING HSU COLLEGE OF PUBLIC HEALTH. EIGHT FOCUS GROUPS REPRESENTING DIFFERENT FACETS (BOTH BROAD AND SPECIFIC) OF THE COMMUNITY WERE ASSEMBLED TO PROVIDE FURTHER COMMUNITY INPUT. FOCUS GROUPS WERE FACILITATED BY A FACULTY MEMBER OF MERCER UNIVERSITY, WHO ALSO ANALYZED AND DOCUMENTED THE FINDINGS. HOSPITAL AND COMMUNITY PARTNERS THEN MET WITH A GEORGIA SOUTHERN UNIVERSITY PUBLIC HEALTH FACULTY MEMBER TO DISCUSS EMERGING TRENDS (AS WELL AS THE TOP CAUSES OF DEATH) AND PRIORITIZATION OF IDENTIFIED NEEDS. IN THE THIRD QUARTER OF FISCAL YEAR 2013, TWO COMMUNITY MEETINGS WERE HELD TO DETERMINE WAYS TO ADDRESS IDENTIFIED HEALTH PRIORITIES AND DEVELOP AN IMPLEMENTATION PLAN.

(ABOUT 200 PEOPLE), DISTRIBUTED THE ASSESSMENT TO COMMUNITY CENTERS AND OTHER LOCATIONS THAT PRIMARILY SERVE AN UNINSURED POPULATION, SENT A COPY TO LEGISLATIVE AND ELECTED OFFICIALS, AND WIDELY DISTRIBUTED THE ASSESSMENT TO OTHER PIEDMONT HEALTHCARE HOSPITALS.

SCHEDULE H, PART V, LINE 11: ADDRESSING COMMUNITY HEALTH NEEDS WHEN PIEDMONT HENRY HOSPITAL PERFORMED ITS INITIAL CHNA DURING FY13, IT FOCUSED ON THREE MAIN PRIORITIES AND STARTED WORK ON THOSE PRIORITIES DURING FY14. FIRST, THE HOSPITAL FOCUSED ON INCREASING ACCESS TO APPROPRIATE AND AFFORDABLE CARE FOR LOW- AND NO-INCOME PATIENTS BY DEVELOPING AND EXECUTING A PLAN TO STRENGTHEN ACCESS POINTS TO THOSE PATIENTS. SECOND, THE HOSPITAL SOUGHT OUT TO REDUCE PREVENTABLE READMISSIONS AND EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT RE-ENCOUNTERS, PARTICULARLY AMONG HIGH-RISK PATIENTS, BY INCREASING CARE COORDINATION EFFORTS BETWEEN THE HOSPITAL AND COMMUNITY- BASED PROVIDERS. LASTLY, PIEDMONT HENRY HOSPITAL FOCUSED ON REDUCING INSTANCES OF PREVENTABLE HEART DISEASE AND STROKE BY UTILIZING COMMUNITY-WIDE AWARENESS CAMPAIGNS AND PROVIDING EDUCATION THAT ENCOURAGES COMMUNITY MEMBERS TO REDUCE THEIR RISKS THROUGH HEALTHY BEHAVIORS.

OTHER KEY HEALTH ISSUES EMERGED DURING THE FY13 CHNA THAT WERE NOT THE FOCUS OF THE IMPLEMENTATION PLAN FOR FY14 THROUGH FY16. THESE ISSUES INCLUDED TEEN PREGNANCY AND ACCESS TO PRENATAL CARE, MENTAL HEALTH, AND TRANSPORTATION. UNFORTUNATELY, PIEDMONT HENRY HOSPITAL WAS UNABLE TO IMPACT TEEN BIRTH RATES AND PRENATAL CARE AS PLANNED, BECAUSE THE CLINIC

WITH WHICH IT PLANNED TO COLLABORATE ON THESE ISSUES WAS CLOSED. WITH RESPECT TO MENTAL HEALTH, THE HOSPITAL DID NOT HAVE THE RESOURCES TO MAKE A MEANINGFUL IMPACT ON THE ISSUE AS PIEDMONT HENRY HOSPITAL DOES NOT PROVIDE MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES IN-HOUSE. FURTHER, AS A HEALTHCARE PROVIDER, PIEDMONT HENRY HOSPITAL IS UNABLE TO SIGNIFICANTLY INFLUENCE TRANSPORTATION OFFERINGS OR TRANSPORTATION-RELATED PROBLEMS IN THE COMMUNITY. HOWEVER, THE HOSPITAL WILL CONTINUE TO SUPPORT AWARENESS AND EXPLORE COMMUNITY-BASED PARTNERSHIPS AROUND THESE THREE ISSUES.

HOSPITAL AND PIEDMONT HEALTHCARE STAFF REVIEWED PUBLICLY AVAILABLE HEALTH AND SOCIOECONOMIC DATA, AS WELL AS DATA COLLECTED THROUGH FOCUS GROUPS, COMMUNITY MEETINGS, AND A COMMUNITY HEALTH SURVEY. THE COMMUNITY HEALTH SURVEY WAS MADE AVAILABLE IN 61 COUNTY-BASED LOCATIONS AS WELL AS ON THE HOSPITAL'S WEBSITE. ALL RESPONSES TO THE SURVEY WERE AGGREGATED, ANALYZED, AND INTERPRETED BY A FACULTY MEMBER OF THE GEORGIA SOUTHERN UNIVERSITY'S JIANN-PING HSU COLLEGE OF PUBLIC HEALTH. EIGHT FOCUS GROUPS REPRESENTING DIFFERENT FACETS (BOTH BROAD AND SPECIFIC) OF THE COMMUNITY WERE ASSEMBLED TO PROVIDE FURTHER COMMUNITY INPUT. FOCUS GROUPS WERE

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FACILITATED BY A FACULTY MEMBER OF MERCER UNIVERSITY, WHO ALSO ANALYZED AND DOCUMENTED THE FINDINGS. HOSPITAL AND COMMUNITY PARTNERS THEN MET WITH A GEORGIA SOUTHERN UNIVERSITY PUBLIC HEALTH FACULTY MEMBER TO DISCUSS EMERGING TRENDS (AS WELL AS THE TOP CAUSES OF DEATH) AND PRIORITIZATION OF IDENTIFIED NEEDS. IN THE THIRD QUARTER OF FISCAL YEAR 2013, TWO COMMUNITY MEETINGS WERE HELD TO DETERMINE WAYS TO ADDRESS IDENTIFIED HEALTH PRIORITIES AND DEVELOP AN IMPLEMENTATION PLAN. HENRY COUNTY HAS ONE PRIMARY CARE PROVIDER FOR EVERY 2,070 RESIDENTS, WHICH IS FEWER PROVIDERS PER MEMBER OF THE POPULATION THAN THE STATE AVERAGE OF ONE PROVIDER FOR EVERY 1,572 RESIDENTS. MORE THAN 12 PERCENT OF ADULTS IN HENRY COUNTY REPORTED THAT THEY WERE IN POOR OR FAIR HEALTH, WHICH IS LESS THAN GEORGIA'S AVERAGE OF 16 PERCENT.

MORE THAN 10 PERCENT OF ADULTS AND 17 PERCENT OF CHILDREN IN HENRY COUNTY LIVE BELOW THE POVERTY LINE. IN ADDITION, 41 PERCENT OF THE CHILDREN IN THE COMMUNITY QUALIFY FOR FREE LUNCH. THE UNEMPLOYMENT RATE IN HENRY

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COUNTY IS 8.1 PERCENT AND MORE THAN 89 PERCENT OF THE COUNTY HAS A HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA.

HENRY COUNTY HAS ONE MENTAL HEALTH PROVIDER FOR EVERY 991 RESIDENTS, COMPARED TO GEORGIA'S AVERAGE OF ONE PROVIDER FOR EVERY 914 RESIDENTS. COUNTY RESIDENTS REPORT AN AVERAGE OF 2.9 "POOR MENTAL HEALTH" DAYS EACH MONTH, WHILE GEORGIA RESIDENTS REPORT ON AVERAGE 3.3 DAYS.

HENRY COUNTY'S TEEN BIRTH RATE FOR 2015 WAS 30 BIRTHS PER 1,000 WOMEN, WHICH IS LESS THAN GEORGIA'S RATE OF 45 BIRTHS PER 1,000 WOMEN. PREGNANT TEENS ARE AT HIGHER RISK OF HAVING PREGNANCY-INDUCED HYPERTENSION, PREECLAMPSIA, AND BABIES WITH LOW BIRTH-WEIGHT.

ONE IN FOUR ADULTS IN HENRY COUNTY IS NOTABLY PHYSICALLY INACTIVE, WHICH IS ABOUT THE SAME NUMBER OF ADULTS WHO IS OBESE. ACCESS TO HEALTHY FOODS IS AN ISSUE IN HENRY COUNTY, AS ABOUT EIGHT PERCENT OF THE POPULATION DOES NOT LIVE WITHIN CLOSE PROXIMITY OF A GROCERY STORE THAT SELLS FRESH FRUIT AND VEGETABLES.

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SHARED MEDICAL RECORDS AND EXPAND THE CLINIC'S CAPACITY WITH ADDITIONAL STAFF; CONTINUING ITS COMMUNITY WALKING PROGRAM CALLED "WALK WITH A DOC"; REVIVING THE BREAST HEALTH CONNECTION PROGRAM TO PROVIDE FREE MAMMOGRAMS AND REFERRAL SERVICES TO LOCAL LOW-INCOME WOMEN; OFFERING ACCESS TO PIEDMONT'S CANCER WELLNESS CENTER, WHICH PROVIDES A BROAD SPECTRUM OF COMPREHENSIVE, INDIVIDUALIZED SUPPORT AND FROM THE POINT OF DETECTION AND DIAGNOSIS THROUGHOUT CARE AND TREATMENT; AND COMPOSING A LOW-INCOME COMMUNITY RESOURCE GUIDE TO BE DISTRIBUTED IN HOSPITALS, TO PATIENTS, AND THROUGHOUT THE COMMUNITY.
